# From the Executive Director

"I lift up my eyes to the hills— from where will my help come? My help comes from the LORD, who made heaven and earth." Psalm 121

2020 has been a noteworthy year for the ministry of Sky Ranch. With the Covid-19 pandemic during the spring/summer and the evacuation during the Cameron Peak Fire throughout the fall, we have experienced many new challenges in "facilitating an encounter with Christ on the mountaintop." During these uncertain and confusing times, these words from Psalm 121 help to remind me that in times of trouble, we need to put our trust in God who is bigger and stronger than any of the challenges we are facing.

Sky Ranch is a ministry that has shaped the faith lives of tens of thousands of youth over the past 57 years. Through fires, floods, evacuations, and bears inhabiting our lodge, this ministry has persevered. This year was no different...although it looked radically different.

Early in spring, the Sky Ranch Board voted unanimously to fund and train the 30 summer staff that we had already hired prior to the pandemic even though we would not be able to host campers up the mountain. While this presented financial challenges, our board believed this was a vital investment in the present and future leadership of our church - equipping and empowering our summer staff to serve. Like the disciples of long ago, they gave up everything and followed. Staff were quarantined on the mountaintop for the summer, providing virtual resources to support our campers and congregations.

As the summer staff left camp after the first week in August, Sky Ranch received a variance from Larimer County to open the

campground and camper cabins to individual family households. Several families registered to escape up to the mountain. After three days of being open, the Cameron Peak Fire broke out and we were immediately evacuated.

Through these adversities, I have been humbled by the outpouring of support for the ministry of Sky Ranch. Alumni staff, campers, congregations, donors, and other ministry partners have all stepped forward to support this ministry. On September 14, after weeks of fire threatening the camp facilities, a special prayer service was organized via Zoom. It was an incredible experience to witness the many generations of staff and campers from across the country that gathered to pray for Sky Ranch and share stories of how this ministry has impacted their lives.

As a result, Sky Ranch has created a new Facebook group (Sky Ranch Lutheran Camp Memories) allowing individuals to share pictures and stories with each other. I am reminded that Sky Ranch's setting is a sacred space, but our identity is really in the staff and campers and the gospel message they proclaim in their words and actions regardless of when or where that might be.

**People ask how they can help. It's easy – get involved!** Pray for us and for all impacted by the fires or the pandemic! When we are finally able to get back to camp, join us! Make a financial gift to sustain this ministry! No camp = no campers = no income, but many of our overhead costs still exist. Over 60% of our income comes from fees collected from our programs. This year we will have lost \$300,000 in revenue from summer programs and another \$100,000 from fall retreats.

This year I have seen how much Sky Ranch means to so many people. Through your support and God's grace, Sky Ranch will still be here impacting lives for generations to come.



## **Cameron Peak Fire**



The Cameron Peak Fire has developed into the 3<sup>rd</sup> largest fire in Colorado's history, and its presence has been felt by much more than the Northern Colorado community.

The fire started near Cameron Pass and Chambers Lake, burning thick dry timber in rugged terrain. It was accompanied by hot dry weather with winds picking up to over 60 MPH. This combination allowed the fire to grow with ferocity and speed.

When the fire started over two months ago, on August 13<sup>th</sup>, the smoke was visible from camp almost immediately. The next day, August 14<sup>th</sup>, we made the decision to bring our two fall hosts down the mountain and evacuate our campground guests. For almost three weeks the fire grew at a steady pace to

around 24,000 acres in the beginning of September. Then beginning on September 5<sup>th</sup>, being fueled with beetle kill trees and strong winds from the west, the fire grew to be over 100,000 acres in the next three days. The fire nearly doubled itself two days in a row spreading over 10 miles to the east in one day. The fire also developed into having three "fingers" One going to the South into Rocky Mountain National Park, one to the North toward the Red Feather and Crystal Lakes area, and the third and largest moved along less than a mile north of Sky Ranch.

What seemed like inevitable devastation for camp was halted by a winter storm, abnormal for the time of year. This snow accumulated for almost two days, laying 8-14 inches of snow across the whole burn area. This snow stunted the fire's growth and gave the staff and community of Sky Ranch, as well as the Northern Colorado community a literal chance to breath. However, this fire devastated 23 homes in the in the Monument Gulch area, only miles from Sky Ranch, during its devastating three day run.

The snow gave firefighters much better odds of controlling this fire, but it did not stop the fire.

On October 9th the fire made it to Sky Ranch property. The southern part of the property is now inside the burn perimeter. Thanks to the hard work of the fire crews there is currently no damage done to buildings at camp, however the forest surrounding us will look different.

Recent strong winds have pushed the fire further east and increasing the total burn area to 203,253 acres.

Over 1,400 fire personnel are hard at work trying to manage the fire while it is still active. As fire lines and other control operations proceed, please keep the firefighters and the communities affected by the fire in your prayers. This fire has taken an emotional, physical, and economical toll on everyone involved. We are grateful for those who have supported Sky Ranch, especially during this summer and fall season, and all of our friends on the mountain.



# From the Youth & Outreach **Program Director**

Summer of 2020 was shaping up to be another awesome summer of ministry. Curriculum was being created, campers were registering, staff hiring was on track, and then our communities started to feel the effects of the Covid-19 pandemic. Throughout March, April, and May we continued planning for a traditional summer, knowing though it would likely not be traditional by any sense of the word. As we got closer to summer, the realization of the future ahead became clearer. Staff and camper safety was top priority, so it was decided that we would not welcome campers or guests on-site at camp this summer. The Sky Ranch Board of Directors committed to providing a safe space for our summer staff and honored contracts for those already hired. June arrives and we welcome our 28 staff to camp to embark on a summer of ministry... differently. Our summer of ministry became a four-pronged approach for our summer staff which included our virtual resource series, work projects on-site, community engagement, and young adult ministry.

Virtual Resource Series: Resources were created to support and strengthen faith formation and share camp experiences at home, with congregations, and in communities. We started with our children's sermon series for congregations based on the summer lectionary. We provided sermons based on the Revised Common Lectionary as well as the Narrative Lectionary. Most of the children's sermons were completed prior to staff arriving at camp staff paired up and the videos produced were fun, creative, and faith filled! The campers and had a pen pal for part of the summer. second component of our virtual resources was our summer curriculum Peace Works, which led us to explore daily themes including Aloha, Ubuntu, Shalom, Agape, and Si Se Puede. Staff worked tirelessly to create Bible studies, worships, environmental education activities, songs, and fun campy activities for a broad range of age groups. Congregations are using the resources as part of their virtual Sunday School programs this fall. Find them https://skyranchcolorado.virtual-camp.org/

Work Projects: We spent some of our time this summer doing projects around camp. (Many of our projects were typical maintenance but a few were projects of opportunity, not having as many people on-site allowed us the opportunity to dig in.) We also had multiple adopt-a-trail groups go and do trail work partnering with the US Forest Service. More on completed projects in the property article.

Community Engagement: One of the biggest challenges of having a summer with no campers or guests was how to stay connected and engaged with individuals and communities down the mountain. Staff spent time this summer writing personal notes to past campers, adult sponsors, donors, and folks in continuing care communities. Some of the staff received letters back from

Young Adult Ministry: We had 28 young adults who came to camp passionate about being active voices and facilitating an encounter with Christ for those who couldn't come up the mountain this year. With that it was important to make sure the staff themselves were being spiritually and emotionally fed this summer. Many things we did this summer supported and encouraged the faith formation and leadership of our staff. Two that stand out to me; partnering with ELCA Young Adults we used their Abide small group series to spur questions and thoughtful discussion. Second was a book study facilitated by Sarah Weaver, one of our off-site coordinators. The staff choose the book Dear Church by Lenny Duncan. Staff gathered every other morning before breakfast on the deck of the lodge to discuss the chapter/s from the previous days.

We can't say thank you enough for the continued support through the pandemic and more recently through the Cameron Peak fire. This summer taught us a lot about how to adapt and do ministry differently. I am grateful for our summer staff that committed to a summer knowing they would not see kids and still choose to be a part of Sky Ranch this summer. We are excited about what this summer taught us and how we can use that moving forward!



This year feels like a global heart break, and it doesn't make sense.

The grief that accompanied us to camp was a challenge. We had to learn a new way to do Sky Ranch, a new way to connect with campers, and to be in community with each other. To create such a unique community together was an incredible blessing. At the very least, we got to do a lot of fantastic hiking. But at the very most, this was God equipping us for civilization with rested hearts and joyful spirits.
